## Family Literacy at Pine Street

*A New Program for Parents and Children*

Pine Street Presbyterian Church, Downtown Daily Bread, and the Adult Learning Center have had a partnership with Tri-County OIC since 2015. Beginning in July 2018, that partnership will be extended to include a Family Literacy program at Pine Street.

In the summer of 2017, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania completely de-funded Tri-County OIC’s Family Literacy programs. Approximately 15 families no longer received adult education, childhood education, or parent education in this setting.

Project Succeed is a comprehensive Family Literacy program that follows the principle that parents are the first and most important teachers for their children. Project Succeed teaches parents how to model positive literacy and behavioral skills that prepare children for academic success. The program offers academic instruction for adults who are preparing to take their high school equivalency examination, learn English as a second language, enter skills training, or seek employment. For pre-school children, Project Succeed offers age-appropriate academic and developmental growth activities.

Tri-County OIC’s Project Succeed Family Literacy programs have helped parents become better teachers by giving them the parenting skills that they need to support their early-age children’s educational growth in school. Families who attend these classes are ethnically diverse, speak a variety of languages, are increasingly

made up of refugees and teenage parents, and have experienced physical and emotional abuse. The program draws on this diversity as a strength from which families can support each other's growth. Cultures and traditions are respected and used as learning platforms for families.

At its April meeting, the Session approved funding for the first year of Family Literacy at Pine Street. Classes will be held four days per week (Monday through Thursday) for three hours (9:30 a.m. until 12:30 p.m.) each session, serving up to 15 adults and 20 children (ages 2 – 4) per year. Early childhood education staffing will include one early-childhood instructor and two aides. Adult education classes will be provided under another funding source (PA Dept. of Education). The program will operate year-round (excluding holiday breaks) with a three-week break at the end of June.

Tri-County OIC will operate the program and be responsible for its staff and content. The adult and parent education will take place in the Boyd Building, and the childhood education component will take place in the Sunday School classrooms at the church.

The first year of the program will be funded from a generous bequest from the Estate of Mary Ann Seipos. From all who knew her, it is obvious that Mary Ann had a love of mission, a love of children, and a love of her church. She gave of herself and financially in all of these areas. She invested herself in education and advocated for children. We are grateful to Mary Ann as we embark on this new mission program.

### **What Dreams May Come**

Manhattan String Quartet

Friday, October 12, 2018 | 7:00 p.m.

Hailed by the *Boston Globe* as “a national treasure,” the **Manhattan String Quartet** is celebrating its 47<sup>th</sup> season. Well known for their performances of 20<sup>th</sup>-century “classics,” the Manhattan Quartet has established a significant international reputation with regular concert appearances throughout North America, Europe, Latin America, and Asia. After a series of concerts in Moscow and Leningrad in the fall of 1985, the Quartet became the first American classical ensemble to give a full tour of the Soviet Union under

that era’s new cultural agreement. Their first sold-out series of performances in 1986 was followed by an equally successful tour in 1989. In 2005, the Quartet made its first tour of Asia and played to sold-out houses in Nagoya and Tokyo, Japan. Notable among its many recordings is the complete cycle of 15 Shostakovich string quartets that *TIME Magazine* called “One of the most important musical events of 1991.”

The Manhattan Quartet’s distinguished catalogue of recordings also includes Eric Moe’s *The Salt of Broken Tears*; Dvořák’s Quartet in G major, Op. 106; a Mozart/Beethoven pairing of live concert recordings; Schubert’s Quartets Nos. 14 & 15 (*Death and the Maiden*); *Adagio for Strings*, featuring Dvořák’s *American Quartet*; popular encores by Turina, Wolf, Puccini, Kern, Gershwin, and Barber; and Carl Maria von Weber’s *Quintet for Clarinet and Strings* with clarinetist Jon Manasse.

### If Music Be the Food of Love

Jakub Józef Orliński, countertenor

Polish countertenor **Jakub Józef Orliński**, Grand Finals winner of the 2016 Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions and winner of the 2015 Marcella Sembrich International Vocal Competition, is quickly gaining a reputation as a singer of striking vocal beauty and daring stage craft. Recent performances include *Messiah* at Carnegie Hall with both Musica Sacra and the Oratorio Society of New York; a debut with the Houston Symphony; Jonathan Dove's modern-day comedy *Flight* with Juilliard Opera; Vivaldi's *Nisi Dominus* and Handel's *Dixit Dominus* with the Karlsruhe Handel Festival; Cavalli's opera *Erismena* with the Festival d-Aix-en-Provence; appearances at

Trinity Wall Street's concerts; and at Oper Frankfurt.

While in Poland, Mr. Orliński performed the roles of Cupid in *Venus & Adonis* by Blow and Narciso in *Agrippina* by Handel. While in Germany, he performed the role of Ruggiero in Handel's *Alcina*; select Purcell songs with ballet at the Leipzig Opera House; and Philippus in Telemann's *Der Misslungene Braut-Wechsel oder Richardus I* (based on Handel's *Riccardo Primo, Re d'Inghilterra*) in Gießen.

Mr. Orliński has triumphed in vocal competitions: First Place Winner at the Oratorio Society of New York's 2016 Lyndon Woodside Oratorio-Solo Competition, First Prize at Rudolf Petrák's Singing Competition in Slovakia, Third Place at the Debut Competition in Igersheim, Germany, Special Mention at the 8<sup>th</sup> Annual Mazovian Golden Voices Competition in Poland, and Third Place at Le Grand Prix de l'Opera in Bucharest, Romania.

In his spare time, Mr. Orliński is also an award-winning breakdancer, and has been a featured model and acrobat for Levi's, Nike, Samsung, Mercedes-Benz, MAC cosmetics, and more.

# Downtown Daily Bread Volunteer Wins Award

## *United Way Youth Volunteer of the Year Award*

On April 19, 2018, Davan Hanley, a student at Milton Hershey School, was presented with the United Way of the Capital Region's prestigious *Youth Volunteer of the Year Award*. Davan showed great leadership in turning a simple sock fundraiser into a community-wide event.

Davan is co-president of Milton Hershey School's student-lead Community Youth Alliance (HCYA). For the past two years Milton Hershey School and Hershey High School have collaborated under the motto "Two Schools, One Hershey." This year during the annual Cocoa Bean Bowl football game they conducted a "Let's Sock Em" sock fundraiser for the hungry and homeless at Downtown Daily Bread.

Under Davan's leadership, the schools created a challenge to see which school could raise the most pairs of socks, setting a goal of 900 pairs of socks. The students even engaged Reebok at The Hershey Outlets, which provided coupons for customers and placed barrels in their stores.

The students amazed Downtown Daily Bread when they delivered 3,060 pairs of socks, far surpassing their goal. Downtown Daily Bread and its clients are proud to call Davan and his fellow students their friends and very special volunteers. They plan to conduct a similar fundraiser this fall.

The United Way of the Capital Region also recognized Pine Street volunteers from the Adult Learning Center who were nominated by Tri-County OIC in the Group Volunteer Category.

Thank you to all who volunteer their time and talents to the mission programs of Pine Street.
